

Reading can be challenging, especially for children who struggle with this skill. This Literature Guide is meant to make it very easy for children with learning challenges such as dyslexia to find success reading a chapter book. The amount of daily reading is not overwhelming for children who have to put so much effort into reading. It is meant to be a read-aloud activity, one-onone. It is perfect for a small group reading center, a homeschooler, or for a parent who wants to help her child with his or her reading at home.

The once a week activity included in this guide adds fun while not burdening the teacher or parent with a lot of extra things to do in addition to other school work.

If your child struggles with reading, you may want to check out the <u>Reading is for Everyone</u> curriculum. It can be purchased separately. This resource takes the learner through the basic phonics sounds and rules using pictures to help associate the concept with the sound.

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
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

Week 1 – Stuffed Felt Pig

- Print out the pig pattern on the next page.
- Cut it out and use it to trace the pig shape onto two sheets of pink felt.
- Use embroidery thread and a needle and sew around the shape, leaving a hole for stuffing.
- Stuff the pig with cotton balls or pillow filling.
- Sew up the hole you left for filling.
- Add an eye, if you'd like.



Week 2 – Chocolate Pudding Mud Pie

- Purchase a Graham Cracker.
- Purchase a box of Jello Instant Pudding.
- Make the pudding according to the package directions for making pie (be sure not to use the pudding directions or the pie will be too runny).
- Pour the pudding mix into the shell.
- Refrigerate until set.
- Enjoy!



Week 3 – Catch the Pig Balloon Game

Here's what you do:

- Purchase a bag of pink balloons.
- Blow up the balloons.
- Draw eyes and pig noses on the balloons.
- Go outside and wet the balloons and rub them with liquid dish soap to make them very slippery.
- See who can catch the most "pigs."
- Have fun!

Tips – you may want to spread out a tarp in your grass and wet it down; put the balloons on the wet tarp versus the ground to prevent popping; use the soapy tarp as a homemade slip –n-slide



Week 4 – Homemade Magnetic Schedule Board

Here's what you do:

- Purchase a cookie pan (Dollar Store)
- Paint the edges of the pan (if you'd like)
- Glue pretty scrapbook paper into the center; you may want to use a sponge brush to spread the glue on the back of the paper
- Buy or make magnets to use on your board.

To make magnets you can...

- Purchase clear aquarium stones. (Dollar Store)
- Purchase circular magnets. (Dollar Store)
- Find pictures in magazines and trace them using the circular magnets.
- Cut the circles out.
- Use clear glue to affix the picture to the magnet.
- Use clear glue to affix the clear stone on top.
- Allow to dry completely.

Week 5 – Gumdrop Spiders

Here's what you do:

- Purchase colorful gumdrops.
- Purchase black licorice.

Week 6 – Keep Your Egg Safe Activity

Here's what you do:

- Purchase eggs one for each child
- Draw faces on the eggs
- Challenge each child to keep the egg safe. Tell your child that you will see whose egg is still intact at the end of the day.

(Note: You can put each egg in a zipper type baggie to alleviate any messes.)



Week 7 – Homemade Bug Catcher

Here's what you do:

Simply take a **mason jar** and remove the inner lid, just keeping the ring handy.

Cut a small square of Chiffon fabric (or and old piece of hosiery).

Place the fabric over the jar and **secure with the lid's** outer ring.

Now go outside and see what kinds of insects you can catch!



Week 8 – Shadow Animal Puppets


- Print out the farm animal templates found at this site: <u>http://www.kideas.com/show/41</u>
- Print the templates onto cardstock for durability. Cut out the shapes.
- Attach each animal shape to wooden skewer using tape.
- Hang a plastic table cloth (one of those you would buy for a birthday party...we happened to have a pink one on hand, but you can buy a white one) across an interior doorway to make a curtain.
- Place a table in front of the curtain (so that the puppeteer's own shadows won't be seen)
- Put a chair behind the curtain and place a flashlight or lamp minus the shade in the chair. (You may need to set the flashlight up on books for added height.)
- Turn the flashlight/lamp on and let your little puppeteer put on a show for the family (he/she may even want to reenact Charlotte's Web)
- If at all possible, video record your child's production so he/she can see the show later too!



Week 9 – Friendship Bracelets

Here's what you do:

- Purchase embroidery thread and braid in four different colors and tie a knot toward the top of the threads and secure the knot under the clip part of a clipboard(first photo)
- Take the 1st thread and put it on top of the 2nd making the number four. Pull the first string through to make a knot. Do this another time.
- Continue with that 1st string and the 3rd string...and 4th string. (Make two knots and move on)
- Now you have a new 1st thread. Start over and continue making two knots with each string.



Note: Another idea for this week's activity is on the next page.

Another idea might be to make a simple braided bracelet from old t-shirts.

I especially like how the second photo uses circular magnets to close these bracelets. I would use hot glue to be sure the shirt ends stay affixed to the magnets.



Week 10 – Cross Stitch Graphing

Here's what you do:

• Purchase a pack of graphing paper and allow your children to draw tiny x's in the squares to form a picture.



• You may choose to allow your child to do a simple cross stitching project instead.



These simple kits can be ordered for around \$4 at <u>this site</u>. There are lots of designs to choose from.

Week 11 – Decorative Storage Pail

- Ask your local school's lunchroom to save a large vegetable can for you.
- Drill holes in each side for the handle.
- Paint the can (either with a spongebrush or take outside and spray paint)
- Stencil on or freehand shapes or the first letter of your name to make a monogrammed pail.
- Add ribbon for the handle. Tie knots on the inside of the pail to keep the ribbon in place.



Week 12 – Homemade Whiteboard

- Purchase a large sheet of "shower board" from Home Depot (or other building supply store). It only costs about \$12 for a huge sheet!
- Cut the board as small as you'd like. It cuts very easily with a jigsaw.
- Use Painting and Drawing Embellishments around the border (they are made for Science Fair type boards and are self adhesive. They cost about \$3 from Walmart) OR hotglue ribbon around the boarder. You may even hotglue a ribbon for hanging.





Week 13 – Magazine Decoupage Pencil Can

- Tear words from magazines.
- Water down regular school glue and use a sponge brush to brush paint onto the can.
- Lay your magazine pieces on top and when covered, brush the entire can with the glue so that all of the corners lay down well.



Week 14 – Journal

Here's what you do:

- Purchase a composition book (the kind with the cardboard back and front)
- Decorate by covering with fabric, decorative paper, stickers, or decoupaging on colorful squares.

Week 15 – Canvas Sack

- Purchase a small canvas sack (or make your own). They cost about \$3 at Walmart.
- Decorate with paint and/or markers.



Week 16 – Buttermilk Biscuits

I cut this recipe from a White Lily flour sack years ago. It is super easy and these biscuits are delicious!

Ingredients:

2 cups self-rising flour

- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar Cheese
- 3/4 cup milk or buttermilk (be sure to use buttermilk)
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

Directions:

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Line baking sheet with parchment paper or foil and spray lightly with non-stick cooking spray. Measure flour into large bowl. Divide shortening into small pieces and scatter on top of flour. Cut shortening into flour with a pastry cutter, two knives, or your fingertips until pieces are pea-sized. Stir in cheese and milk, stirring only enough to moisten flour and hold dough together. Drop by rounded tablespoons onto baking sheet. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until tops are golden brown. Brush with garlic butter.

Garlic Butte: combine butter and garlic powder until well blended.

Makes 12 to 15, 2-inch biscuits.

Here's what you do:

Simply use blankets and sheets and some dining room chairs to create an indoor tent!



Week 18 – Cotton Candy Treat

Here's what you do:

• Buy some cotton candy for a special treat this week. You should be able to find it at Walmart or at a movie rental store.



Week 19 – Homemade Jelly

This is the recipe from Certo that we used:

4 cups prepared strawberries (buy about 2 qt. fully ripe strawberries)
7 cups sugar, measured into separate bowl
1/2 tsp. butter or margarine (optional)
1 pouch CERTO Fruit Pectin

BRING boiling-water canner, half-full with water, to simmer. Wash jars and screw bands in hot, soapy water; rinse with warm water. Pour boiling water over flat lids in saucepan off the heat. Let stand in hot water until ready to use. Drain well before filling.

STEM and crush strawberries thoroughly, one layer at a time. Measure exactly 4 cups crushed strawberries into 6- or 8-quart saucepot.

ADD sugar; stir. Add butter to reduce foaming. Bring to full rolling boil (a boil that doesn't stop bubbling when stirred) on high heat, stirring constantly. Stir in pectin. Return to full rolling boil and boil exactly 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Skim off any foam with metal spoon.

LADLE immediately into prepared jars, filling to within 1/8 inch of tops. Wipe jar rims and threads. Cover with 2-piece lids. Screw bands tightly. Place jars on elevated rack in canner. Lower rack into canner. (Water must cover jars by 1 to 2 inches. Add boiling water, if necessary.) Cover; bring water to gentle boil. Process 10 minutes. Remove jars and place upright on towel to cool completely. After jars cool, check seals by pressing middle of lid with finger. (If lid springs back, lid is not sealed and refrigeration is necessary.)

(Our jelly was long gone before I was able to take a picture of it! It was so delicious. The kids even made a label and commercial to go along with it! I have a Movie Making Basics eBook for sale that shows how we made the commercial, if you are interested.)



Week 20 – Bank

Here's what you do:

- Wash out an empty water bottle and let dry completely.
- Cut out ears and a strip of paper for around the middle (if you'd like).
- For the nose, use punch holes to create the two pink circles and glue to the top of the water bottle.
- You can hot glue beads on the bottom if you'd like for the legs (we just left ours without feet).
- Parent should use a sharp knife to cut a slit on top for adding coins.

Note: I didn't have a photo of the one we made, but we cut pink ears from construction paper and added a pink pipe cleaner tail. We also glued wiggly eyes on instead of the black circles shown in this photo.)

Week 21 – Egg Sack Piñata

Here's what you do:

- Follow this recipe to make paper mache paste:
- Combine 1/2 cup all-purpose flour and 2 cups cold water in a bowl. Add this mixture to a saucepan of 2 cups boiling water and bring it to a boil again. Remove from the heat and stir in 3 tablespoons of sugar. Let it cool; it will thicken as it cools. Once it does, it's ready to use. (This recipe comes from <u>Family Fun</u>.)
- Put candy into a large balloon and blow it up. (This will take some patience.)
- Cut lots of newspaper sheets into strips.
- Dip the strips, one by one, into the paste and lay on the balloon.
- Continue until the whole balloon has been covered and then repeat to create several layers of newspaper (this makes the piñata harder to bust...the thicker the better!)
- Paint any color you'd like (if you want an authentic egg sack piñata, paint it white.)

Week 22 – Winter Scarf

Here's what you do:

• **First Step:** We bought 1/4 yard of fleece fabric. We bought ours at Walmart and it was cost \$2.24, for the 1/4 yard.



• **Second Step:** We spread the fleece out on our craft table and trimmed both ends. The lady at the fabric department did a good job cutting down the sides, so we didn't have to do any extra trimming there.



• **Third Step:** Cut slits on each end. There really is no way to mess this up. Just cut the slits all the same length. Next, tie each strip in a knot as shown in the photo.



• Here's the finished scarf!!



• My daughter even made a tiny one for her stuffed animal!!



• This craft was so easy to do and so affordable, that we made several!!
